North Pond is located west of the center of South Chesterville. The main inlet, Huckleberry Stream, enters the north end of the pond from Mud Pond. Its marshy outlet flows south into Little Norridgewock Stream. The pond's shoreline is mostly undeveloped.

Water quality in North Pond is good for warmwater gamefish with high water temperatures and oxygen levels at all depths. Vegetation and boulders along the shoreline provide habitat for largemouth bass and chain pickerel. White and yellow perch also provide good fisheries. The pond is not stocked.

North Pond is accessible via a rough side road off the Borough Road. The pond is open under general law in both the summer and winter fishing seasons. See the lawbook for additional regulations.
