Annual stockings of brown trout in Kalers Pond are necessary to maintain the sport fishery due to the lack of trout spawning habitat. Kalers Pond provides one of the best brown trout fisheries in the mid coast area. The wariness of brown trout and their specific feeding habits make them very difficult to catch so the anglers must hone their skills to be successful.

Kalers Pond is also noted for its very good chain pickerel fishing. There is a large population of pickerel and many of these fish grow to large sizes.

Access to Kalers Pond is via a dirt road over private property to an unimproved launch site. This road is seasonal and cannot be used during the spring mud season. The public must respect the property owner's rights for this access, if this site is to remain open. A parking area is available. Anglers can access the pond via a short walk during the spring mud season.
