Scraggley Lake is a picturesque, remote lake in the headwaters of the West Branch of the St. Croix River. Scraggley Lake is connected with Junior Lake by a wide thoroughfare. An unusual feature of this lake is its extremely irregular shoreline.

At the present time Scraggley Lake is inaccessible by car, but you can get there by plane or boat or afoot.

Scraggley Lake is capable of providing what is commonly known among fishery scientists as a "two-story" fishery. This means nothing more in this case than that the lake is capable of providing a fishery both for the large established assemblage of warmwater game species and one or more coldwater game species, in this case, salmon.

Salmon stocking will be required to maintain the fishery. Stocking of warmwater game fish is unnecessary.

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
