
Little Cathance Lake is located about 1/4 mile west of the so-called "14 Ridge Road" in Plantation No. 14. Access is possible with a 2-wheel drive vehicle.

This lake provides habitat for warmwater gamefish species. Smallmouth bass have become established since the original lake survey was done in 1957. Today the lake contains an abundant population of bass, mostly only 7-10 inches in length. However, on rare occasions, the lake has yielded bass up to 5 pounds.

Brook trout are also taken occasionally, probably having migrated in from the outlet, which contains some good spawning and nursery habitat. No stocking is recommended, however, because of unsuitable habitat in the lake and competition from established fish species.
