a. Highlights - Employee Health & Wellness - <i>Shonna Poulin- Gutierrez</i>	 Information contained in written reports; highlights and discussion noted below: <u>American Rescue Program Act (ARPA)</u>: Individuals who lost their employer-sponsored health coverage because of an employee's involuntary termination of employment or reduction of work hours can continue that coverage through COBRA at no cost to the member from April 1 to Sept. 30, 2021. COBRA offers are being sent to eligible individuals by csONE. 	



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	 <u>Covid-19 Vaccine:</u> Anthem has processed 7,300 vaccination claims as of May 11, 2021 with 3,189 members fully vaccinated as of May 11, 2021. <u>Extended Coverage for Covid-19 (Anthem):</u> Coverage has continued for the month of April. Total cost associated to date 3M. As of May 11, 2021, there have been 41 inpatient admissions. <u>Covid-19 (Aetna):</u> Total State of Maine members 9,401 with at least 3,654 receiving one dose and 3,194 members fully vaccinated. <u>Strategic Planning:</u> Employee Health and Wellness is meeting with Lockton for strategic planning, currently exploring resources for oncology. <u>Committees:</u> Second appeals committee was held on April 15, 2021. It is anticipated that more committee meetings will be scheduled for next year. <u>Wellness Highlights:</u> Naturally Slim percentage of participation five sessions benchmark of 69%-83%. Health Premium Credit 2021 deadline was April 30th, 2021. As of May 11, 2021, A total of "My Health" section completed is 7,647. Living Resources Program continues to offer training to departments. <u>Communication Highlights:</u> Health Premium Credit postcards were mailed to all active state employees as well as statewide email on April 20th, 2021. Annual Open Enrollment information was distributed by email on May 7th & May 10th as well as by home mailer. <u>Contracts:</u> Employee Asistance Program (Living Resources) contract
b.Financial Update – Frank Wiltuck	 extended for three months. Information contained in written report; highlights and discussion noted below: <u>Balance Sheet:</u> State FY2021 through 4/30/21 Equity is \$207.7M <u>Reserve Calculation:</u> Required Reserve Balance for FY2020 is \$50.4M <u>Operating Statement:</u> State FY2021 through 4/30/21 Revenues over Expenses is \$43.5M Heather Perreault discussed how we got the surplus. SOM was 36M in the hole in 2017 and Aetna paid out 9M when the SOM moved to Anthem. FY2019 the balance was positive 40M and FY2020 was positive balance of 104M. Moving retirees off the Anthem plan to Medicare Advantage may have contributed to the surplus and another



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	piece was Covid-19. The rates for this year were based on normal activity.

Committee meetings have been virtual; full Legislature has been meeting infrequently at Augusta Civic Center. Enacted Legislation: LD1 An Act to Establish the Covid-19 Patient Bill of Rights and To Amend the Governor's Emergency Power. Pending Legislation: LD738 - An Act to Provide High-quality Health Care for All Maine Residents, LD1045 – An Act to Support Universal Health Care, LD1608 - An Act to Expand the MaineCare Program To Cover All Citizen's, LD120 – An Act To Lower Health Care, LD749 – An Act To Establish a Council on Health Systems Development, LD1196 – An Act Regarding Targets for Health Plan Investments in Primary Care and Behavioral Health. Telehealth-Eight bills related to telehealth: LD 323, LD333, LD649, LD791, LD849, LD1007, LD1194, and LD1361. Most would require coverage of audio. Mandated Benefits: LD441 – An Act to Expand Adult Dental Health Coverage, LD665 – An Act to Improve Access to HIV Prevention Medications, LD1357 – An Act to Require Private Insurance Coverage for Postpartum Care, LD1531 – An Act to Provide Affordable Behavioral Health Services to Individuals under 26 Years of Age, LD1539 – An Act to Provide Access to Fertility Care, All but LD1115 carried over for mandate review by Bureau of Insurance. Prescription Drugs: LD1117 – An Act to Reduce Prescription Drug Costs by Using International Pricing, LD1266 – An Act to Reduce Prescription Drug Costs by Using International Pricing, LD1706 – An Act to Require Appropriate Coverage of and Cost-sharing for Generic Drugs and Biosimilars.

Rebates reduced Plan Cost PMPM from \$191.49 to \$144.05. <u>Top Line Performance Metrics by LOB:</u> Actives had the lowest Plan Cost Net PMPM at \$131.68, trending at 10.4%, Retirees had the highest Plan Cost Net PMPM at \$293.59, trending at 11.6%. <u>Top Line Performance Metrics by Specialty</u>: 368 unique specialty patients, an increase of 30 specialty patients.
