






URBANIZATION 2060

"The Fire in the East" - Dave Kittridge

 The National Woodland Owner Survey estimates as few as 4% of family woodland owners have a management plan, and only 14% consult a forester before a timber sale

 At the rate cost-share plans are being adopted by woodland owners it would take 144 years for all owners in the NA to have one



"The Fire in the East"

 The National Woodland Owner Survey documents that ownerships change hands every 26 years

It all adds up to a moving target of owners, a downward spiral of ownership sizes, and an overall erosion and permanent loss of private forestland



"Engaged" Landowners

- Thus, research indicates only about 15 % family woodland owners are "engaged" in the management of their woods
- By engaged, we mean owners who consult foresters, participate in cost-sharing or conservation easement programs, and who generally make good stewardship decisions about their land
- Lack of engagement with your woods generally means lack of appreciation for your woods




LANDSCAPE STEWARDSHIP







Family Forest Owners: An In-depth Profile Sustaining Family Forests Initiative, 2006






Communications are Key





Forest Stewardship Program Reform Example - Quabbin to Cardigan Mt.

Quabbin Corridor Connection Project –

18 parcels, 1,700 acres

Total Cost - \$4.24 million

Aggregator: Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust

USFS Forest Legacy as buyer, with matching funds or bargain sales by Mass DCR, Ashburnham Conservation Trust, North County LT, Nashua River Watershed Council, two towns

Many sellers, many aggregators, one intermediary, one lead buyer, many matching funds

Stewardship Project

- State Forest Resource Assessment
 - Analyze conditions and trends; Delineate priority landscape areas



- Long-term State-wide Strategies
 - Address priorities and resources necessary to implement
- Forest Stewardship Reform
 - Working in priority landscapes to address critical resource issues in an integrated fashion
