## **Bee Plants**

Most bees utilize plants for nectar and/or pollen. Bees prefer flowers that are tube-like or bell shaped and are yellow, white, blue, or purple with ultraviolet nectar guides. Bee flowers often require complex behaviors by a bee to access the nectar or pollen. When planning a bee garden, choose native or well-behaved non-native plants. Provide bees with continuous blooms throughout the foraging season and a diversity of plants to support a variety of pollinators. Planting each species of plant in clumps can increase pollinator efficiency. Clump planting allows a bee to easily visit the same type of flower over and over, reducing the need to relearn how to enter the flower to extract the pollen and/or nectar.

Below is a list of plants commonly used by bees for nectar and/or pollen and approximate bloom times for Maine.

## Flowers (Native)
