I wanted to offer my comments in regards to the expansion of the wind project in Clifton. I live in Clifton with my husband and 2 children. We purchased our home here specifically for the recreational opportunities provided by the many hills to hike and ponds to boat and swim. Shortly after moving to Clifton, the town overwhelmingly approved the first phase of the wind business. I was a part of a group of Clifton citizens who opposed it.

I want to make it known that I am not in support of wind energy here in Maine. I don't just oppose this project for being in my backyard.

As a fiscal conservative, I do not believe in the economics that go into the business plan for the wind development. It is not a profitable business plan unless the developer can lock in higher than normal electricity rates and subsidies from the government. This has a negative affect on the already high electricity rates that we Mainers are forced to pay.

As a lover of the outdoors, I do not believe that wind energy is worth the destruction to our mountains and views.

As a real estate agent, I believe these wind turbines negatively affect property values and the incentive to purchase property in the areas affected by them.

As a proud Mainer, I believe these wind turbines negatively affect tourism, one of the few industries left in the state.

I am in support of finding and using renewable sources of energy. Here in Maine, we have benefited from the clean energy produced through hyrdo power. I believe Maine took a big step backward when it failed to recognize hydro power as "green" energy. In light of the recent approval of the new corridor that will give us access to the affordable and clean hydro power from Canada, I feel that wind power is no longer relevant to the discussion of providing "green" energy to the northeast. Not only that, wind power cannot even be considered "green" when you look at the impact to the environment in the production, shipment, and installation of these turbines.
