Leading Causes of Death, Maine: 2000 Women 25 Years Old and Older (preliminary data)

➡ In 2000, 6,381 Maine women, 25 years old and older, died; 70% of these deaths were due to the 5 leading causes - heart disease, cancer, cere-

brovascular disease, chronic lower respiratory disease (CLRD), and Alzheimer's disease.

Heart disease, the leading cause of death for Maine women, accounted for 1,743 deaths (27%), and cancer, the 2nd leading cause, for 1,511 (24%). These 2

diseases were also the leading causes of women's deaths nationally. Maine's death rate due to heart disease was significantly lower than the U.S. rate; the cancer death rate was significantly higher.

Cerebrovascular disease and chronic lower respiratory disease were the 3rd and 4th leading cause of death for women in Maine and the U.S.. The death rate due to cerebrovascular disease was comparable to the U.S. rate; the Maine CLRD rate was significantly higher than the U.S. rate.

The 5th leading cause of death to women in Maine and the U.S. was Alzheimer's Disease. The Maine death rate from this disease, 71 deaths/ 100,000 population, ranked highest in the nation. Maine's death rate from this cause was sig-

nificantly higher than the US rate (41.8 deaths/100,000) and significantly higher than any other New England state.

- Maine death rates for women who died from cerebrovascular disease, CLRD, and Alzheimer's disease were the highest in New England.
- Eighty-five percent of deaths to women 25 years old or older occurred to women over 64. This was consistent with what occurred nationally.
