
MAINE VITAL STATISTICS SYSTEM: 1993 - 2002 (preliminary)

- During the 10 year period, 1993 2002, 97% of the women who had babies in Maine reported their race as white; this was comparable to the proportion of Maine's population that reported their race as white during the 2000 U.S. Census. The 3% who reported other races, accounted for 3,760 births. Percent of Non-White Mothers by Race Maine: 1993 - 2002
- Forty-five percent of the women who reported their race as non-white on their baby's birth certificate, reported that they were Asian or Pacific Islanders.
- Allopathic physicians (M.D.) attended Asian/Pacific Islander: 45% more than 75% of all Maine births during 1993 - 2002. Asian/Pacific Island women were more likely to have M.D. attendants (83% of births) than either white (77%) or American Indian (69%) mothers. American Indian mothers were most likely to have a mid-wife (16%) or an osteopathic physician (15%) as an attendant.
- **➡** Women 20 to 34 years old delivered 78% of the babies born in Maine over the 10 year period. Percent of Mothers by Age and Race
- Ten percent of mothers were younger than 20 when their baby was born: American Indian mothers were more likely to be adolescents (20%) than other mothers.

- Twelve percent of Maine mothers were 35 years old or older when their baby was born; Asian/Pacific Island mothers were more likely than other mothers to be in this age group (17%).
- **▶** During 1993 2002, more than three quarters of new Asian/Pacific Is-

lander mothers (78%) were married when their child was born. This compared to 71% of white mothers, 58% of black mothers, and 41% of American Indian mothers.
