DISTRICT PUBLIC HEALTH OVERVIEW

The establishment of the public health districts was designed to enhance effective and efficient delivery of public health services by:

- Creating the geographic and local framework for greater consistency and equity in statewide delivery of all 10 Essential Public Health Services.
- Providing a consistent basis for regional planning and coordination across the governmental, private (including business), public, and nonprofit sectors.
- Building sustainable infrastructure through regional colocation of Maine Center for Disease Control and Prevention (Maine CDC) and Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) staff, and through an interactive, fully participatory District Coordinating Councils.

Each District includes a Public Health Unit. These units' primary aim is to enhance communication and coordination of state public health programs at the district and local levels. The Maine CDC York Public Health Unit includes staff from across multiple Maine CDC divisions including the District Liaison, Health Inspection Program, Public Health Nursing, Infectious Disease Field Epidemiologist, Drinking Water Program, and the District Public Health Educator. The York District Public Health Council (YDPHC) will hold their quarterly meeting on Zoom September 23 from 9am to 10am

THE ROLE OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH UNIT

The Public Health Districts are each supported by a Maine CDC District Liaison (DL). A DL strengthens communication between Maine CDC and the District's institutions, including health care systems, schools, and communitybased organizations.

The Health Inspection Program exists to protect the public health by providing licensing and inspection services for a number of different types of businesses such as school cafeterias, campgrounds, restaurants, and tattoo parlors.

The Division of Public Health Nursing includes a team of registered, professional nurses who work to improve the health of individuals, populations, cultures, and communities through services such as immunization and maternal/child health services.

The Infectious Disease Epidemiology Program works to monitor and prevent infectious diseases in Maine. These diseases are caused by certain viruses, bacteria, fungi, or parasites including Tuberculosis, Vibriosis, and Influenza.

The Drinking Water Program regulates public drinking water supplies for both municipal, and non-municipal water systems such as schools, restaurants, and mobile home parks.

The District Public Health Educator works directly with the DL to ensure communication across the District and implement Maine CDC public health priorities and initiatives.

Public Health Unit Spotlight

York Public Health District Liaison, Adam Hartwig, has been a DL with Maine CDC for 12 years! Prior to working for Maine CDC Adam worked for the Tompkins County Department of Health as the Bioterrorism Preparedness Coordinator.

Adam holds a Bachelor's Degree in History and Pre Law from St. John Fisher University, and a Masters of Science in Healthcare Administration from the Rochester Institute of Technology.

When he is not working he enjoys spending time with his family and watching and coaching his kids in Lacrosse, Soccer, and Basketball.

STATE GOVERNMENTAL PUBLIC HEALTH IN MAINE

The mission of Maine CDC is to protect and promote the health and well-being of the people of Maine. Programs across Maine CDC work together in a strategic way to achieve short- and long-term results to protect and improve population health.

District Public Health falls under Maine CDC's Division of Public Health Systems. District Public Health staff work with many other Maine CDC programs, and as noted above, the District Public Health Unit also has staff from other Maine CDC Divisions, bringing work at the Statelevel to communities across Maine. The Division of Public Health Systems protects the health and lives of people in Maine by strengthening the ability of health agencies and partner organizations to detect, contain, and manage public health threats and emergencies. Other non-governmental sector partners may include health care, public safety, housing, transportation, land use planning, education, media, environmental health, philanthropy, community economic development, social services, and civic organizations. Mosquitoes in Maine can carry viruses that can cause several illnesses. These include West Nile virus (WNV), Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE), and Jamestown Canyon virus (JCV).

Dr. John Kelly is the Elizabeth R. Spallin Professor of Psychiatry in Addiction Medicine at Harvard Medical School-the first endowed professor in addiction medicine at Harvard. He is also the Founder and Director of

the Recovery Research Institute at the Massachusetts General Hospital (MGH), the Associate Director of the Center for Addiction Medicine (CAM) at MGH, and the Program Director of the Addiction Recovery Management Service (ARMS). His clinical and research work has focused on addiction treatment and the recovery process, mechanisms of behavior change, and reducing stigma and discrimination among individuals suffering from addiction.



Dr. Linda Durst currently serves as Chief Medical Officer for Maine Behavioral Healthcare and Chair, Department of Psychiatry, Maine Medical Center and holds the appointment of Visiting Associate Professor, Tufts University School of Medicine.

Dr. Durst has been actively engaged in the area of suicide prevention, developing a suicide screen for the University of Arizona Health System, South Campus, active in multiple quality improvement teams on suicide prevention, and has taught physicians and non-physicians in suicide assessment. She chaired the Hartford Healthcare Behavioral Health Network's Suicide Prevention Task Force and had been responsible for rolling out Zero Suicide to the Hartford Healthcare Behavioral Health Network and assisting in the roll-out in the state of Connecticut. Dr. Durst was elected as a member of the American College of Psychiatrists in 2017, for her expertise in Administrative Psychiatry. Currently, Dr. Durst is planning to introduce Zero Suicide to the MaineHealth system.
