
This pond can be reached from several directions over gravel roads. In the spring, a 4-wheel drive vehicle is advisable. Small boats/canoes can be launched at an unimproved site at the outlet. In the past, this pond produced some handsome 3 to 4-pound brook trout. This fishery has disappeared, probably due to over-fishing, especially in the winter. Because the pond has acceptable water quality for coldwater sportfish and stocked brook trout failed to produce a satisfactory fishery, an experimental splake stocking program was initiated in 1982. This hybrid has exhibited

reasonably good growth and survival, and has provided a satisfactory fishery. Most angled splake are 13-14 1/2 inches (age II's), but some age III and older splake from 18-21 inches are routinely caught. To maintain the good openwater fishery, the pond is closed to ice fishing.

The pond still yields a handful of wild brook trout, but neither their numbers or size are noteworthy. Pickerel are uncommon due to the scarcity of suitable habitat.
