Approval of December 11, 2012 Commission Meeting Minutes	Copy of minutes received by all Commissioners.	Commissioner Glazier moved for the approval of the minutes. Commissioner Spirer seconded. All present voted in favor. Approved.
Operations Reports Review	<p>Director Pelletier presented the <u>December 2012 Operations Reports</u> to the Commissioners. He explained that the Commission ran out of funds in December. The Revenue account was used to pay \$140,000 in vouchers in Q2. In FY'13 Q1 and Q2, revenue collections were below the allotment, which was set by the revenue forecast committee; the Commission had projected higher numbers. Director Pelletier expressed hope that the tax offset program would boost Q3 and Q4 revenue totals. Chair Mitchell asked whether the Commission knew the exact amount generated from previous years offset programs. Commissioner Carey recalled that the tax offset funds were never separated from regular collections, but were usually reflected in Q3.</p> <p>Commissioner Carey asked Director Pelletier if he knew why there was such a substantial increase in voucher averages, noting that appeals were \$600 over the average and felonies over by approximately \$100. Director Pelletier indicated that while it was a surprise to him, he did review a number of homicide appeals recently. Commissioner Carey cautioned that this is a trend we should watch.</p> <p>Director Pelletier explained that the expenses associated with the December trainings still have to be paid. Director Pelletier told the Commissioners that the Conference account was healthy (\$11,817) and that he is thinking about future trainings. Commissioner Carey proposed having a one or two day advanced CLE at a reduced fee to participants.</p>

	<p>Commissioner Spirer inquired whether a reduced fee CLE would be able to cover the cost of that type of program. Director Pelletier confirmed that the Commission would be able to offer a reduced fee CLE since the Commission has been able to build up its Conference account by holding video replays which only have minimal costs. Chair Mitchell asked how much the Bangor training cost – Commission Carey estimated \$12,000 to \$15,000, while Director Pelletier recalled the cost being a bit higher, around \$15,000 to \$16,000.</p>	
<p>Consideration of Amended Chapter 301</p>	<p>Before discussing the proposed rule change, Director Pelletier summarized the budget analyst’s documents showing what will be included in the Governor’s biennium budget: changes to the Conference account and Personal Services account were just as the Commission requested; the baseline budget for FY’14 and FY’15 will fully fund the Commission at the \$50/hr rate; and the Governor proposed a \$5/hr rate increase in FY’15 to \$55/hr. Director Pelletier noted that while this is far from what the rule proposes, this demonstrates that the governor’s office recognizes that the Commission’s baseline budget needs to be increased. Director Pelletier then briefly outlined the timeline of events in the budget process, noting that Friday is the deadline for the Governor to submit his supplemental and biennial budget, which will then be followed by public hearings on both the supplemental and biennial budgets.</p> <p>The discussion then turned to the proposed hourly rate increase for attorneys. Commissioner Carey proposed two changes to the Commission’s response to the public hearing comments. He requested that the language in response #6 be amended to reflect that the \$60/hr. rate recommended in 1999 is probably the correct starting point for comparison based on inflation, but that the proposed rate increase strikes the right balance between adequate attorney compensation and the available state resources. He also requested that response #7 be amended to reflect that the proposed rate increase strikes the right balance between the need to support and maintain lawyers and law practices and the availability of state resources. All voted in favor to accept the responses to public comments as amended.</p> <p>Chair Mitchell expressed his belief that the Commissioners went through the rule-making process carefully, and now after hearing from the public and after completing their due diligence, that the Commission was ready to take a vote. Commissioner Spirer moved to adopt the amended rule; Commissioner Carey seconded the motion. All voted in favor to</p>

	adopt the amended Chapter 301 rule.	
Consideration of Rate of Pay for Private Investigators	<p>Chair Mitchell gave a brief overview of the history of the rate of pay for private investigators working on court-appointed case. The Commission currently pays a rate of \$25/hr., and this rate has remained unchanged since it was set in 1977. The rostered PIs have requested the Commission raise the rate of pay to \$35/hr in FY' 14 and to \$40/hr in FY' 15. Chair Mitchell then allotted time for those present at the meeting to address the Commissioners about the need for an increase in the hourly rate. Six private investigators, including two who represented private investigator associations, spoke at the meeting. Their comments focused on the following six points: (1) the \$25/hr rate is inadequate; (2) costs have risen since 1977, including mandatory liability insurance, license fees, continuing education training programs, BMV services, etc.; (3) PIs charge approximately \$50 to \$65/hr in retained cases, making it increasingly difficult to do court-appointed cases at the \$25/hr rate; (4) PIs save the State money since their work helps reduced charges and/or the need for costly trials; (5) a \$10/hr increase is not an unreasonable request; and (6) if the rate is not raised the Commission will lose experienced investigators.</p> <p>Chair Mitchell asked the PIs to gather data about the rate of PI pay in other states and to submit it to the Commission. Commissioner Carey asked Director Pelletier to gather information about what the budgetary impact would be if the Commission was to raise the PI hourly rate.</p>

DATE: MARCH 7, 2013

Attached you will find the February, 2013 Operations Reports for your review and our discussion at the upcoming Commission meeting on March 12, 2013. A summary of the operations reports follows:

- 2,096 new cases were opened in the DefenderData system in February. This was a 100 case decrease from January.
- The number of vouchers submitted electronically in February was 2,327 totaling \$963,131.05. We paid 2,249 electronic vouchers totaling \$911,003.25.
- There was 1 paper voucher submitted and paid in February totaling \$820.72.
- The average price per voucher in February was \$405.26, slightly above the average cost per voucher that we have seen this fiscal year to date. For Fiscal Year 2013 the average price per voucher rose \$.09 to \$401.36.
- Appeals and Felony cases were the highest average vouchers in February.

In our All Other Account, the total expenses for the month of February were \$968,634.92. Of that amount, only \$8,247.45 was devoted to the Commission's operating expenses.

In the Personal Services Account, we had \$36,572.02 in expenses for the month of February.

In the Revenue Account, our monthly transfer from the Judicial Branch for counsel fees for the month of February, which reflects January's collections, totaled \$52,226.36, an improvement over our average monthly collections so far this year.

In February, we had no additions to our conference account, and we spent \$542.39 to reimburse the revenue account for expenses related to the December training that were paid out of that account. This brought our Conference Account total balance to \$10,629.16.
