Your Library Name, along with other Maine libraries, now offer nearly 2,500 eBooks spanning bestselling Fiction, Non-Fiction, YA and Children's content as downloadable eBooks. This is in addition to the ever-growing collection of downloadable audiobooks. This collection is called the **Maine InfoNet Download Library**.



Anyone with a valid *Your Library* card, a computer, a connection to the internet can access and download books free of charge. This collection of materials is offered through Overdrive, a global digital distribution company.

Project Gutenberg www.gutenberg.org

Over 33,000 titles including fiction and nonfiction in all genres and categories, as well as multiple languages. Perhaps the best site for older fiction, including out-of-print children's titles. Multiple formats are available for down-loading of use on nearly all mobile devices.

Smash Words www.smashwords.com/

Over 30,000 titles, mostly selfpublished, from independent authors and publishers. While not all the titles listed are free, it is very easy to limit browsing to only the free titles.

Many Books www.manybooks.net/

Over 29,000 titles, primarily fiction. The collection has some overlap with Project Gutenberg, but includes some unique titles.

Internet Archive www.archive.org/

Over 2.7 million texts, mostly nonfiction. The bulk of the titles have been contributed by academic libraries. This is a good source for historical works. This archive also contains movies, video of music concerts, audiobooks, music, podcasts and the internet Wayback Machine for viewing archived websites.

Forgotten Books

www.forgottenbooks.org/ Almost 10,000 titles. Though there is quite a bit of overlap with Project Gutenberg, this site does include some unique titles.

Thousands of eBooks. Many are not free, although there is a collection of public do-main items that can be read on all mobile devices. Also includes copies of new re-leases for purchase.
